Travel Security

- 1. Secure your home, and arrange for it to be checked by a friend or the police.
- 2. Secure all valuables off premises in a safety deposit box.
- 3. Videotape or photograph your home's contents for insurance purposes.
- 4. Have the post office hold your mail; cancel or hold any newspaper deliveries.
- 5. Make sure your bags are well-marked with a work address/number or cell number.
- 6. Arrange air travel during business hours, where possible, to avoid reaching your destination at night.
- 7. Avoid late business meetings, and if one does occur, make sure you are in the company of multiple associates.
- 8. Do not accept a hotel room in a remote section of the hotel.
- 9. Do not stay at a hotel with exterior room entries.
- 10. Do not accept a hotel room if the windows and/or doors are not secure.
- 11. Always use security locks; brace the door if needed.
- 12. Do not answer the door unless you are expecting company.
- 13. Stay in a quality hotel with 24 hour security.

Night-Life Security

- 1. Do not enter a bar in a strange location; if you must do so, do not go alone.
- 2. Do not leave a bar in the company of strangers.
- 3. Do not engage in conversation with anyone who is aggressive, overly flirtatious, or who persists in invading your safe zone.
- 4. Leave immediately if there is any indication of hostility.
- 5. Do not engage in behavior generally thought to be aggressive (staring, aggressive verbal and body language, etc.)
- 6. Leave the facility when others are walking out, so witnesses are present.

Calling for Emergency Assistance

- 1. Remain calm and call the police.
- 2. If using a cell phone, ask to be connected to the 911 operator for the location you are calling from.
- 3. State your concern as clearly as possible.
- 4. Stay on the line until police arrive; give as much info as possible re the situation.
- 5. If you are calling about an assailant or suspicious subject, give as much identifying information as possible.
- 6. Advise the dispatcher if the suspect and/or you are armed, and if so with what weapon. If you are armed, place the weapon on the ground when police arrive.
