Introduction

Self-Defense is a privilege

Self-Defense issues can be raised in two contexts:

1. Civil (monetary damages)

2. Criminal (jail time/fine)

Definition of Assault and Battery

1. Assault = causing another imminent apprehension of bodily harm

2. Battery = carrying through on threat of physical harm by bodily contact

Requirement of "Apprehension"

1. A person must have a reasonable fear of being assaulted

2. Relative age, size, strength all factor into a finding of reasonable

Duty to Warn

- 1. Must warn if there is reason to believe a warning would deter/delay attack
- 2. Safe course is to let an aggressor know you have had some training

Duty to Retreat

- 1. No duty to retreat in a simple A&B case
- 2. Duty to retreat may exist prior to defending yourself w/deadly force
- 3. No duty to retreat on own premises (Castle Doctrine)
- 4. No duty to retreat if you cannot do so safely
